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# Why have I been prescribed pregabalin?

Pregabalin has been prescribed by your consultant in the pain clinic.

Pregabalin is used to treat specific types of pain.

Pregabalin is used to treat nerve pain. For example stabbing and shooting pains.

Pregabalin is in a group of medications called anticonvulsant medications, which can also be used to treat patients with epilepsy.

# How does pregabalin work?

Pregabalin works as a neuromodulator. The medication changes the way that nerves pass messages to the brain. If the messages received by the brain are reduced, the pain experienced is reduced.

#### When should I take it?

You will be given instructions on how to take this medication and how to increase the dose, if necessary, by your consultant in clinic. The tablets can be swallowed whole with a glass of water. Pregabalin can be taken on an empty or full stomach. Do not take more than you are prescribed.

# How long do they take to work?

All patients are different; however, you may notice a benefit within a couple of days. The full effects of the medication can take up to a month to be experienced.

You may also need to increase the dose of pregabalin for it to be effective in managing your pain.

Pregabalin, unfortunately, doesn't work for everyone. If, on balance you have seen no improvement in your symptoms after 4-6 weeks of commencing the medication, you must not just stop the medication without speaking to your doctor first.

# What are the potential side effects?

Side effects can be most noticeable after initially starting the medication or increasing the dose. These side effects can settle given some time.

Common side effects are drowsiness, dizziness and fatigue. If any of these symptoms are severe, contact your doctor or pharmacist for immediate advice.

Less common side effects include visual disturbances, weight gain, memory loss, indigestion and mood changes. If any of these symptoms are severe, contact your doctor or pharmacist for immediate advice

# What if I forget a dose?

Take it as soon as you remember. However, if your next dose is almost due, skip the missed dose and take your medication as normal. Do not take two doses together.

# What if I want to stop the medication?

Do not stop taking this medication suddenly. Speak to your doctor who will be able to advise you how to gradually reduce the dosage of medication before eventually stopping it completely. We advise you read the manufacturer's information for patients.
