

This is a primary brain tumour.




The next steps

What are steroids?



You may have been given some steroid tablets, called dexamethasone.

These help with swelling inside of your brain.

Steroids can also affect your sleep, this is why they are taken earlier in the day.







What is a seizure?



Sometimes if you have a tumour in your brain, you may have a seizure.

If you think you are having seizures, please tell your GP or keyworker. If you cannot get in contact please go to the emergency department at the hospital.







This could be shaking or twitching of your arms and legs.

Sometimes you may not know that you are having a seizure.

You may be given some medication to prevent more seizures.



You cannot drive with a brain tumour and you need to inform the DVLA of your diagnosis.
