What is self-administration?

Self-administration allows you to administer your own medicines whilst in hospital, rather than being given it by a nurse.

Why should I self-administer my medicines?

Administering your own medication gives you greater responsibility for your own care. It will help you to increase your knowledge of your medicines and you can take your medication at the right time for you.

If changes are made to the medication you use, or the dose, you will be informed immediately, so you can get used to the changes before you go home.

What happens now?

If you wish to self-administer your medicines the nurse will go through some questions and ask you to sign a consent form.

How to self-administer?

- After an initial period of supervision, you will be given a key to the individual medicine locker by your bed. You must keep your medicines in the locker and keep the key in a safe place. (If a key is not available the nurse will open the medication locker when you are due to take your medicines or when you press the call bell).
- Your own medication will be used if possible, but some may need to be obtained from the hospital pharmacy. Inform the nurse if you need a further supply.
- Some medication may still need to be given to you by the nurse, for example pain killers, injections and new medication that may not be permanent.
- Tell your nurse immediately if you make a mistake or miss a dose.

What if I need help?

- A carer can assist the nurse in administering your medication if they are responsible for doing so at home.
- A carer of a child can administer medication if they are responsible for doing so at home, have consent to do so from the child's legal guardian and are assessed as competent by the nurse.
- If you are in doubt about how or when to administer your medicines check with your nurse or pharmacist.
- A medicines reminder chart can be completed to help you remember the names and times of your medicines and any special instructions.
- If you feel too unwell to manage your own medication inform the nurse immediately.
- You can withdraw from the scheme at any time, just inform the nurse.
