Using Your Own Medicines Whilst in Hospital

INTRODUCTION

This leaflet is provided to you to explain how we use your own medicines from home during your stay in hospital.

USING YOUR OWN MEDICINES WHILST IN HOSPITAL

At Southport and Ormskirk Hospitals NHS Trust we run a scheme where you will continue to use your own medicines from home during your stay in hospital. We will provide any extra medicines you need from the hospital pharmacy.

WHY?

- To make sure you have the correct medicines in hospital.
- To make going home quicker.
- To help you understand what medicines you should be taking.
- To reduce wastage.

WHAT WILL HAPPEN TO YOUR MEDICINES?

- When you come into hospital a member of the Pharmacy Team will check your medicines to see that they are in good condition, in date, labelled correctly and are the medicines your doctor wants you to take.
- We will normally only use medicines in labelled containers with your name and the directions.
- Your own medicines will be stored in a locked medicines locker next to your bed or in an individual tray in the medicines trolley along with any new medicines you may need.

WHAT IF I HAVE QUESTIONS ABOUT MY MEDICINES

- A member of the Pharmacy Team will be available weekdays 8.30am to 5pm to answer any questions or give you information about your medicines.
- All medicines come with patient information leaflets.

WHAT IF I NEED NEW MEDICINES OR THERE ARE CHANGES TO THE MEDICINES I USUALLY TAKE?

- Any new medicines will be supplied by the hospital pharmacy and put in the medicine locker next to your bed or in the ward medicines trolley.
- If your dose changes but the medicine remains the same, pharmacy will re-label your medicines with the new instructions.
- Any new medicines will be labelled with directions explaining how to take them. This should speed up your discharge.

WHAT HAPPENS TO MEDICINES I NO LONGER NEED?

- If your medicines are no longer needed or are damaged or out of date we can safely dispose of them for you.

WHAT WILL HAPPEN WHEN I GO HOME?

- The doctor will write a prescription for the medicines you need to take when you are due to go home.
- A member of the Pharmacy Team or nurse will check the medicines in your medicines locker and give them to you along with a copy of the discharge prescription.
- Please make sure you take your medicines from the bedside locker or ward medicines trolley when you go home and return the locker key (if appropriate).

HOW DO I GET MORE MEDICINES?

- You will need to obtain more supplies from your own GP. Your GP will be informed of your discharge medication. Please see your GP at least 5 days before your medicines run out.

During your time in hospital, it is important to us that you are happy with your care and treatment. Please speak to a member of staff and/or the ward/department Sister/Charge Nurse if you have any questions or concerns.

MATRON

A Matron is also available during the hours of 9am – 5 pm Monday to Friday. During these periods, ward/department staff can contact Matron to arrange to meet with you. Out of hours, a Senior Nurse can be contacted via the ward/department to deal with any concerns you may have.

INFECTION CONTROL REQUEST

Preventing infections is a crucial part of our patients' care. To ensure that our standards remain high our staff have regular infection prevention and control training and their practice is monitored in the workplace. We ask patients and visitors to assist us in preventing infections by cleaning their hands at regular intervals and informing staff of areas within the hospital that appear soiled.

As a patient there may be times that you are unsure whether a staff member has cleaned their hands; if in doubt please ask the staff member and they will be only too happy to put your mind at ease by cleaning their hands so that you can see them.
