Acupuncture for Pain Relief

Physiotherapy Department

What is Acupuncture?

Acupuncture involves the insertion of very fine needles into certain points on the skin. The needles, which are sterile and single-use, penetrate the skin and/or muscle and are disposed of safely after each treatment.

How does it work?

Modern scientific research has found that acupuncture can stimulate the relief of pain by nerve reflexes causing the brain to release the body's own natural painkillers, called endorphins. It can also help to modify the way in which impulses carrying pain travel to the brain.

Is Acupuncture an accepted physiotherapy treatment?

Yes. Physiotherapy is the treatment and prevention of injury and disease by physical means. Physiotherapists have specific training in a wide range of treatment methods, which can be used alone or in combination. Acupuncture is just one of those methods.

Does it affect me as a Blood Donor?

You can still be a blood donor if you have received acupuncture from a health care professional working within the NHS.

What can I expect?

Your physiotherapist will make a thorough assessment of your problem and decide whether acupuncture is an appropriate treatment to offer to you.

If you choose to have acupuncture, your physiotherapist will ask you to sign a hospital consent form to allow acupuncture treatment.

After assessment, your physiotherapist will select certain acupuncture points which they feel are most appropriate for your condition. The area to be treated will be swabbed with an alcohol wipe and the needle or needles will be inserted, and left in place for 5 to 20 minutes, after which the needles will be removed and disposed of safely.

What will I feel?

You will feel a slight pricking sensation as the needle is inserted. There are different types of acupuncture e.g. standard, electro-acupuncture, trigger point, and auricular acupuncture. All can feel different and your therapist will advise on what to expect.

Whilst the needles are in place you may feel a warmth or heaviness in the area treated and may feel sleepy and relaxed after treatment.

You may notice an effect immediately on your symptoms or there maybe a delayed response.

At each visit your response to treatment will be evaluated and further treatments will be planned as appropriate.

We aim to improve your condition within 3 to 6 treatments and consider this an optimum number of treatments for most conditions.

Are there any side effects?

During treatment you may experience feelings of drowsiness and calm. You may still feel a little drowsy after your treatment and therefore should not drive until you have fully recovered.

You are advised not to attend acupuncture appointments on an empty stomach. Acupuncture can cause a slight drop in your blood sugar level and eating will help prevent any risk of fainting. You should eat one hour before treatment and within two hours after treatment.

Minor bleeding or bruising occurs after acupuncture in about 3% of patients

Pain during treatment occurs in about 1% of treatments. Existing symptoms can get worse temporarily after treatment. You should inform your physiotherapist if concerned.

Are there any conditions where acupuncture may not be a suitable treatment option?

Possible contra- indications :

- Pregnancy
- Needle-phobia
- ***Allergy to metals***
- Diabetes
- Blood clotting disorders
- Anticoagulant therapy
